Barriers to Learning and Attainment for Pupil Premium Children

- Assessment data shows that disadvantaged pupils, in Nursery and Reception enter the school with lower levels of language and greater need of SALT provision.
- Through feedback and observation, it appears that the importance of adults who can facilitate and model language as well as deliver SALT therapies is crucial in ensuring that we address this need.
- Lack of consistent exposure to good quality English language model at home
- Lack of opportunities to read at home.
- Limited opportunities to develop fluency and understanding of quality texts
- Lack of opportunities to experience inspirational cultural activities on a regular basis
- Ongoing difficulties and disruptions in home situations (including difficulties related to housing)
- Difficulties related to Emotional wellbeing and resilience of pupils.

Desired Outcomes For Pupil Premium Children

- Children to make accelerated progress in speech and language, reading, writing and mathematics.
- Improved levels of engagement and participation of pupil premium children across the school
- Pupils well-being is supported effectively to ensure they are ready for learning and develop a passion for learning
- Pupils develop stamina and independence to achieve personal targets and are well prepared for success in the future.
- High quality curriculum initiatives to improve pupil engagement and progress
- Parents and carers encouraged to play an active role in their child's education.
- Children and families believe they can do well in the future
- Pupils will leave the school with higher levels of spoken and written language
- Disadvantaged pupils have access to opportunities that they otherwise would not have, e.g. music, art, drama, sport etc;
